



Porsche PFM

The aircraft engine PFM 3200 (PFM: Porsche Flugmotor) was built by Porsche in the late '80s (1987 to 1989) for the single-engine airplanes Robin, Mooney (pictured) and Cessna. The engine developed 217 bhp at 2,343 rpm with a recommended TBO (time between overhaul) of 2,000 hrs. For the Mooney, the maximum level speed at sea level was 168 knots and had a 55% power cruise speed of 152 knots. The base price for a Porsche equipped Mooney in 1988 was a minimum of \$158,000 and an IFR equipped plane ranged from \$187,000 to \$200,000. Mooney produced only 42 of these aircraft.

While based on the automotive design, its components, tolerances, and other design features are totally different and the engines have virtually no interchangeable parts. Technically, the PFM engine, while not perfect, was a significant advance in aircraft engines. While common to automobiles, the PFM had electronic ignition, computerized fuel metering, a reduction gearbox (.44:1), torsional dampers variable timing and a cooling fan to name a few.

Unfortunately these features added complexity, unreliability (for the 1980's) and weight to the engine. Because of the increased engine weight and airframe modifications to accommodate the engine, the Mooney PFM flew slower than the comparable Mooney 201. The engine turned out to be a failure as it was probably too sophisticated, over designed and ultimately too expensive to maintain (required 100 hr inspections and the TBO was less than the 2,000 hrs). The Porsche PFM lived a short life, but a few are still flying.

Sorry... the meeting was held the night before. There is no one to blame but me.







Details make a difference

If you haven't had a chance to clean your car this winter or you put it away for the

winter, we have some simple reminders for you. Everyone knows how to wash a car, I think, but, the details make a difference.

If your car is covered, you should roll, not drag the cover off the car and across the paint. The beginning of any cleaning starts with the inside. The front seats come out very easily in most of these cars, if you really want to clean it out. Vacuum and dust the car. I prefer not to use vinyl protectant that will make it hard to see out of the windshield with a glare from the dash. Some low gloss products are easily substituted.

You may want to clean the inside door jambs and ends of the dash now. The last part of the inside is to clean the glass inside and with the best cleaner you can find. The outside isn't cleaned until you are done washing it. Industrial glass products seem to work well.

Now for the outside. You should rinse the car and remove as much as possible with water only. When applying soap, use a soft mitt. Sponges will hold the dirt and brushes will scratch even your wheels and definitely your paint! If you have an old brush, then you can use that to clean the wheel wells! They should be cleaned as well, but not with the same applicator! Always wash from top to bottom and rinse that way as well. Use a separate mitt for the wheels. Soap and water will usually be enough.

Once you are done washing you should dry with a high quality chamois that is rinsed frequently while drying. Let the car sit for a few hours if possible before beginning any wax coating.

Waxing the car should actually begin with a pre-cleaner followed by a glaze and then a wax protectant. If you have a dark color car, the glaze is an important step to hide fine scratches. The lighter the color, the less they will show. Wax or teflon protectants should not be used over fresh paint for at least 45 days due to solvent trapping.

On **August 7th**, we will again meet atop Afton Mountain at 10:00 AM





Who says the Cayenne is the first Porsche SUV?



Spotted recently at the G and W Motorwerkes "Museum" was this extremely rare 1955 Model 597. Porsche Hunter. It was developed during the mid 1950's as an all terrain military vehicle.

The power plant for this four-wheel drive vehicle was essentially a 356 engine, producing 50 bhp. It never got less than 23 miles to the gallon. Top speed...62 miles per hour. Steepest gradient it could climb, a whopping 65%! And it could float! But not under its own power.





Perhaps the rarest feature of this Porsche "Jagdwagen" (hunting car) is the original documentation that accompanies it. Even the "blueprints" are included.

Porsche developed the vehicle for NATO and the restructured post World War II German army. But for political reasons, the 597 was not chosen, despite the fact that it passed all its tests with flying colors. Porsche produced a civilian version in 1958, without much commercial success.
