Falling into place.....





Then I notice in Mel Brannon 's Membership Report on page 10, that half a dozen folks either forgot or chose not


to renew their membership last month. Editor, Phil Audibert



Tech-Tactics.....

Boxster speedo error.....by Phil Audibert

Some time ago, I was participating in a fox and hounds rally in my '99 Boxster when I noticed that I had significantly higher end-of-rally mileage than other participants. And I had not taken that many wrong turns.

And then one time, coming home from an autocross, I was driving on the Interstate with the speedometer precisely on 65 mph and my wife Susie

blew by me in the 356. I asked her how fast she was going and she said "I was going 65...YOU were going slow."

terstate, I set my odometer to zero at the

mileposts and found that the speedo was clocking a mile at every nine tenths or so.

I decided to look into this further.

So the next time I got on the In-

In Culpeper, there is an outfit called Bumper to Bumper Auto Parts Specialists. They have a calibration machine. Apparently they do a brisk business with the state police division headquarters just outside of town, as well as with their , uh, victims. People go there to get their speedos calibrated, hoping against hope that their readings are slow, hence the reason they were doing 75 in a 55 mph zone. You need all the help you can get in court.

Anyway, I backed the Boxster onto this contraption where the rear wheels were resting on two rollers and let her rip...or actually, the technician let her rip. And out came the following report which came signed, sealed and NOTARIZED!

When my speedo read 25 mph my car was going 21.8;

at 35 it was 32.0;

45 became 41.3;

55 dropped to 51.0;

at 65 M.P.H., I was really going 60.5;

75 became 69.8;

and finally, 85 on the speedometer was really traveling at 79.3.

By the way, I should mention that I performed this test on factory wheels and tires.

Needless to say, this report would not do me any good in court because it's all going the wrong direction. It would convict me. But I will say that since I performed this test I routinely run the car in the mid seventies when driving on the Interstate. And I haven't been pulled yet. 


Why would anyone keep an old 356 around?

The meeting, held at Crown Motorcar in Charlottesville, began at 7:00 PM and ended about 7:50 PM.

Driving Events: Rick stated that the dates for the autocrosses at the Government Center have been finalized and that suitable sites for an autocross are becoming scarce. Rental of the Government Center site still includes an employee fee of \$150 and about \$150/\$200 for the lot. Rick and Alex discussed the need for increasing the track fee from \$20 to \$25. The increase was approved. Phyllis agreed to find out about using the parking lot of a shopping center in the vicinity of Waynesboro. It may be possible to save money on site rental. Rick pointed out that the Zone 2 driving event is approaching, April 2nd-4th, and that our region will not be a sponsor this year. He also mentioned that the SCCA will present an event on September 19th and that G&W Motorsports will not be offering an event this Spring but will have their Fall event the week before Thanksgiving this year.

RPM: Alex put in a pitch for this year's gathering, the 8th annual, on June 4th-6th and indicated that sponsors are still welcome. He has secured motel rooms and the autocross site (Southside Speedway) which was more expensive this year.

New and Old Business: Rick mentioned that he will attend the Zone 2 President's meeting on March 27th and lamented the fact that it coincides with one of our tours. He intends to become involved with the 50th Anniversary Porsche Parade and has encouraged the rest of us to do the same. Rick is also determined to find a speaker or some sort of presentation for one of our meetings and once again addressed the question of making our mailing list available to various vendors. He felt that the membership already receives enough advertisements. Right on Rick! Alex presented the most recent financial statement and noted that \$360 should be added as income. He displayed the new car badges - and as the consummate salesman sold two of them - and said that shirts and baseball caps are available. Phyllis and Alex will be attending the Porsche Parade in Fort Worth this summer and noted that they have not received much information about it yet. One important aspect is that this will be the first parade to offer a Club Racing event, held at the Texas Motor Speedway, as well as an autocross.

Adjournment: The meeting ended with an informal questions and comments session. Alex explained his recollection of attending a past Porsche Experience driving event to Herb.


