impacts. The list could go on and on with extra accessories such as a radio/intercom system, air ventilation ducting, and a drink hose with bite valve. As for prescription eyeglasses, look to get a pair without the ear hook. You may also want to get the shatter-proof lenses in a small oval frame just for the use with the helmet.

I hope this helps. Be safe, have fun and enjoy your spring and summer!


## From the Editor's Desk



Buying a helmet without trying it on first is very common. In this case, just get a good measurement around your head just above your eyebrows and the ocular bone on the back of the head. You should try this a few times and use the largest. Some helmets are sized with the standard "XXS-XXL" and others use a fitted hat size like "6 ¾-8 ½". Consult with your salesperson closely on this as the different brands will differ slightly when relating to size. Here is an example from Bell.



Starting with a Nomex balaclava, here are some other items to consider. Not only is this an extra layer of fire protection, it will also help keep your sweat from going directly into the helmet's padding. You can pull the balaclava off after your session and air it out. That way it'll be nice and dry when it's time to go out again. Another benefit is that balaclavas do a nice job preventing the dreaded ear-fold-down. At the very least, this is a good item to have in-pocket if you have to borrow a helmet.

Next is a neck collar or helmet restraint device. They are both designed to support the helmet and reduce its movement range in the event of an impact. The systems from Hans and Tucker are the better choices, and the collars are nice for sleeping on a long flight! Choose the one best suited for your needs and budget.

Most helmets come with the basic clear shield. I suggest having a few extras as well. Examples include amber, for bright but overcast days, light or dark smoke, for very bright sunny days and the new iridium mirror shields. These come in different colors and are essentially like high-quality sunglasses (polarized, UV protection). Besides, they look cool!

A helmet bag is a must to keep the scratches to a minimum and more importantly to keep the structural integrity safe from even the most minor of (Continued on page 23)

#### **DIRECTIONS TO RPM**

#### ARRIVING FROM THE NORTH ON 95 SOUTH

Take exit #79 – Powhite Parkway, Interstate 195 South—stay in left lane on exit ramp—veer left to take 195 South to Powhite Parkway. Stay on Powhite Parkway—cross the James River, pay .50 cent toll. After toll stay in middle lane & continue on Powhite Parkway. Take Route 60 exit – Midlothian Turnpike (pay .25 cent toll). Take route 60 West. Look for large shopping center on right – Chesterfield Towne Center. 1 block after mall turn right onto Alverser Drive Go 1 long block until stop sign – turn left onto Old Buckingham Road. Look for Black Heath Road (do not turn)—look for tall white gates and house number on front gate (12200)

#### ARRIVING FROM THE SOUTH ON 95 NORTH

Take Chippenham Parkway - Route 150 North exit. Stay on this road a long time. Go long way on Midlothian Turnpike –look for large shopping center on right (Chesterfield Towne Center). 1 block after mall, turn right onto Alverser Drive. Go 1 long block until stop sign – turn left onto Old Buckingham Road. Look for Black Heath Road (do not turn)—look for tall white gates & house number on front gate (12200)

#### ARRIVING FROM THE EAST ON 64 WEST

Take exit #190 – Petersburg & 95 South. Immediately take exit #74A – Downtown Expressway to Powhite Parkway. Pay .50 cent toll—continue on Powhite Parkway (stay left at split). Cross James River & pay .50 cent toll—after toll stay in middle lane & continue on Powhite Parkway. Take Route 60 exit – Midlothian Turnpike (pay .25 cent toll). Take Route 60 West. ## Tech Tactics.....



Safety Gear Guide By Dan Nahas with CDOC

afety gear should be comfortable, relatively new and used correctly to maximize it's effectiveness in saving you from serious injury or worse. Whenever budgeting for any track-bound car, whether it's the occasional driver education or for a professional racing series, the safety items should always be figured into the overall package of the car. For every upgrade in

power, handling and braking, some sort of safety item should be added as well. In the next few articles, I'll touch on a number of different items of gear that may help you make choices as you accumulate items to support your efforts on the track.

**1. Helmet** You can't go far without this first necessity. So many drivers will spend untold amounts of money on their car but not their own head. In some ways you will get what you pay for. The cost of Kevlar and carbon fiber composites to make the helmet lighter and stronger is obviously more than the cost of fiberglass. A lighter helmet is not only comfortable in hard cornering and braking, but also safer as it reduces the forces on the neck and spine in the event of a collision. The G-forces can be tremendous for a very short time during a collision; so, reducing the mass being thrown around will help you.

When choosing a helmet style, think about all possible venues where you may use it. If you want the least expensive open-face helmet, this may limit your opportunity to jump into a formula car or an open cockpit car as well as a kart. If you are driving a car with a functional air bag, do not use an open-face helmet. If you plan to only use your helmet in your enclosed car, you could avoid the other end of the spectrum as well. You won't be needing spoilers and other aerodynamic features of some of the very high-end helmets.

As for fit, the helmet should be as snug a possible without being painful. If you think it might be a little too tight when you first try it on, you should give it the ten minute test. After that time, you'll either have a headache or you've forgotten all about the helmet and are thinking about other things. There's your answer. If you find yourself between sizes, go with the smaller one. Keep in mind that the padding is new and cold. Over time the padding will break-in to conform to your head's shape and become more comfortable. The larger size will just get looser. This is unsafe as it will allow your head more momentum before striking the inside of the helmet in the


Herb Distefano conducted the meeting, in his inimitable style, in Phyllis Scrogham's absence.
